Demographic Context

According to Census 2010 data, Clackamas County residents identified themselves as 84.5% white/not-Hispanic. The remaining 15.5% is composed of a diverse population. Clackamas County has speakers of at least 46 languages. According to American Community Survey data (2005-2007), the highest percentage of non-English speakers are Spanish speakers at 5.5% of the population. Russian speakers make up the next highest block at just over 1% of the population.





Transportation & Health - Strategies for Improving Health & Equity (White Papers 5.4 & 5.5)

- Five primary ways TSPs can directly and indirectly improve health and equity
 - 1. Reduce crash-related injuries and fatalities for bicyclists, pedestrians, and motorists
 - 2. Increase opportunities for physical activity
 - 3. Decrease exposure to air pollutants
 - 4. Improve access to a wide variety of health supportive resources (e.g., healthy food, employment, affordable housing, parks, recreation)
 - 5. Reduce health inequities
